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# Hearing from the Lord

Professor Efe Ehioghae, the University Pastor, handled the first devotional titled "Reflecting on our Walk in Families." Drawing from Mark 10:9 and Malachi 2:16, he emphasized the importance of avoiding toxic marriages and illustrated this point with examples from the Bible, asserting that light can only shine in darkness when God is involved. Professor John Sotunsa. the Provost of Benjamin Carson College of Health and Medical Sciences, served as the devotional speaker for the second day. His

message, titled "Reflecting on our Health," centered on Amos 3:1-3 and Deuteronomy 32:30. He identified loneliness as the major trigger of most diseases, and hereafter encouraged the audience to love and seek the ultimate companionship with God, who guarantees protection and good health, and also with their fellow humans.
