But today's world demands more agility, creativity, problem-solving, and entrepreneurial courage. MADE equips educators to embed these values into their pedagogy.

- Cross-Disciplinary Reach: From Engineering to Literature, every discipline has entrepreneurial possibilities.

THE MADE JOURNEY

The first edition, held 3 years ago, brought fresh winds of change. Lecturers became more innovative, hackathons flourished, and students started engaging in entrepreneurial challenges. MADE 2.0 expanded this vision, deeper conversations, departments, more stronger collaborations, and even young entrepreneurs joining to showcase the possibilities of mindset shift in action.

PROGRAMME FLOW

Day One: Registration, welcoming addresses, foundational lectures.

Day Two: Deeper lectures, collaborations, fair competition, and young entrepreneurs' pitches.

Day Three: Hands-on projects, interactive sessions, and closing reflections.

ATMOSPHERE

The MADE 2.0 hall was vibrant. Faculty grouped by departments at their tables. Each day punctuated with tea breaks and lunches that became networking spaces. Conversations flowed from lecture halls to corridors, and from structured sessions into informal chats

PREPARATIONS BEHIND THE SCENES

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THE EFFORT BEFORE THE APPLAUSE

Every great event is built on unseen labor. For MADE 2.0, months of planning preceded the opening day.

DAY ONE HIGHLIGHTS



SETTING THE FOUNDATION

Day One was about orientation and mindset shift.

The registration desk was alive with greetings and smiles. As faculty settled at their departmental tables, the hall buzzed with expectation. The atmosphere was both formal and familial.

Dr. Ajibade's welcoming remarks reminded everyone: "We are here to reprogramme not just our teaching, but our thinking."

Foundational Lectures

The lectures probed deeply:

- Are we teaching students to repeat facts, or to create solutions?
- Do our classrooms mirror the real world, or a past that no longer exists?
- What must change in us before it can change in our students?

Discussions spilled into tea breaks, where participants animatedly debated new approaches. By the time the day closed at 4pm, many felt they were at the start of something profound.

DAY TWO HIGHLIGHTS



Day Two was the most vibrant. Lectures were followed by collaborative group work where faculty from diverse disciplines brainstormed entrepreneurial applications.

The Fair Competition

Groups pitched ideas ranging from tech-enabled teaching aids to community-driven health initiatives. Judges praised their creativity and pushed them to think bigger.

Young Entrepreneurs Take the Stage

This day also opened a platform for young innovators to inspire their lecturers:

- Anjola Ajayi, Founder of ACAD Al: Joining virtually via Google Meet, she introduced ACAD Al, an artificial intelligence platform that helps lecturers set, grade, and analyze exams more effectively. Her presentation sparked curiosity and reflection: "If young entrepreneurs are already building tools to support education, what should we as lecturers be doing to prepare students for this future?"
- Three Emerging Entrepreneurs: A trio of young innovators showcased their products and talents, underscoring the importance of giving students real platforms to express ideas. Their courage reminded faculty that innovation thrives when nurtured early.

By the close of Day Two, it was clear: entrepreneurship was not an abstract idea. It was real, practical, and already alive in the next generation.

DAY THREE HIGHLIGHTS



Day Three began with interactive projects. Faculty teams designed lesson plans, assignments, and assessments infused with entrepreneurial thinking. Instead of traditional tests, they explored case studies, prototypes, and problem-solving challenges.

The Student Perspective

The highlight came when Samuel Oyefusi, a student from Pan-Atlantic University, was invited by Dr. Peter Bamkole to share his journey. His presentation was magnetic. Drawing from his LinkedIn reflection, Samuel spoke about:

- Leadership lessons he learned at PAU.
- The role of innovation and diligence in shaping students.
- His belief that every university can raise future leaders if the right mindset and systems are in place.

He humorously noted how he and Dr. Bamkole had matched outfits by coincidence, a reminder that mentorship often goes beyond the classroom.

His humility, authenticity, and bold vision left faculty deeply moved. Many admitted they had underestimated what students could teach them.

The programme concluded at 1pm, but the lessons lingered: entrepreneurship is not just taught, it is demonstrated, lived, and passed on.

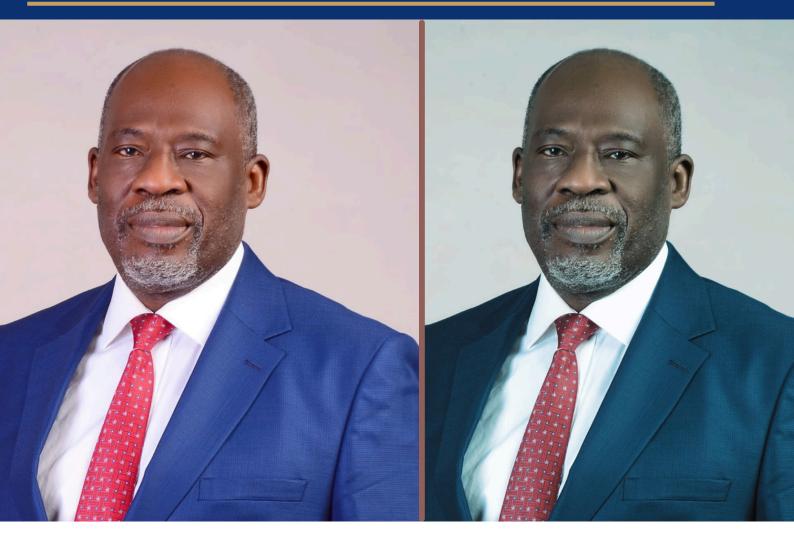
100 EDUCATORS, 30+ DEPARTMENTS, ONE VISION
