EDITOR'S REFLECTIONS

An interesting story is related in 2 Chronicles chapter 25 about a prince named Amaziah who became a King at the age of 25 and reigned for 29 years. The scriptures record Jehoaddin from Jerusalem as his mother. Verse two of that same chapter says he did what was pleasing to the Lord but did it reluctantly.

Another prince named Joash became king at a very young age. In fact, he is on record as the youngest king to ever reign in Judah. Verse two of 2 Chronicles chapter 24 says Joash did what was pleasing to the lord as long as Jehoiada the priest was alive.

We see another interesting story of another king who reigned in Judah in chapter 27 of the same book. Jotham became king after 25 years and ruled in Jerusalem for 16 years. "He did what was pleasing to the Lord, just as his father done; but unlike his father he did not sin by burning incense in the Temple" (2 Chro 27:2).

These illustrations are meant for me to check my life and stop to ask myself how my relationship with God really is. Do I serve God for my own selfish reasons?



Do I serve with a perfect heart or are there conditions attached to my service for God? Are there situations that if they become non-existent today my relationship with God will follow suit?

As we ponder on these things and read through this July issue, it is my earnest prayer that we will serve consistently, genuinely and faithfully and be encouraged to live for God every moment of our lives.

PLEASING GOD

Let's be honest. Do we really want to please God all the time? You know the answer better than anyone else. Deep down, we long to hear Him say, "Well done." Everyone enjoys a pat on the back, a gesture of approval and praise. But with so many voices pulling at us—social media, culture, deadlines, and even our own self-doubt—it can be hard to know what a life that truly pleases God looks like today.


It's reassuring to know that God is not waiting for us to be perfect before we can please Him. Neither is He watching for us to slip so He can punish us. What He wants is a heart that leans toward Him, a life that says, "Lord, I trust You," even when things don't make sense.

Hebrews 11:6 gives us a solid foundation: "Without faith it is impossible to please God,

because anyone who comes to Him must believe that He exists and that He rewards those who earnestly seek Him." Faith is all about honest trust. When we believe that God is real, present, and good, and choose to live like it, we bring joy to His heart. Abraham did just that. He wasn't per-

fect, but he believed God's promises, and that was enough to please Him.

In our achievement-focused world, it's easy to think God is impressed by our spiritual accomplishments such as titles, good deeds, or how many Bible verses we can quote. But God is not hiring workers. He is inviting sons and daughters into relationship. He wants your attention more than your activity. From that relationship flows something beautiful: obedience. Not forced or fearful, but born of love. When we love God, obeying Him doesn't feel like a heavy burden. It becomes our joyful response. It means choosing honesty even when lying



seems easier, forgiving when it's hard, and

holding to His values when the world pulls the other way.

We also face the subtle pull of people-pleasing. The need for approval can shape our choices more than we realize. Whether it's chasing likes online or applause in real life, we often drift from our convictions to fit in. But Paul reminds us in Galatians

1:10: "If I were still trying to please people, I would not be a servant of Christ." Pleasing God may not always win us popularity, but it brings us peace. When God becomes our audience, we stop performing and start living with purpose and confidence.

The life that really makes heaven smile is a fruitful one, not just successful by the world's standards but spiritually productive. That might mean showing kindness when others are rude, holding onto peace in chaos, or choosing joy when things go wrong. Colossians 1:10 tells us to "live a life worthy of the Lord and please Him in every way: bearing fruit in every good work."
